




Home Learning from Miss Burrows

Drawing Rules!

We are learning to use different lines, patterns and shapes within our drawing





The famous artist Paul Klee said “a line is a dot that went for a walk”. Here are some of his art pieces above. Do you like them? Why? How do they make you feel? What mark would you give them out of 10?

First we will practise **controlling** our pencil to draw different **lines** and **shapes**. Get a piece of scrap paper.

How many of these can you draw? Can you think of any other lines and shapes?

1. A Straight Line 	2. A wavy line 	3. A zig zag line 	4. A curved line
5. A circle 	6. A spiral <i>(start in the middle)</i>	7. A square 	8. A dashed line
9. A dotted line 	10. A star 	11. A Triangle 	12. A dark line and a light line <i>(lean heavier or lighter with a pencil for this one)</i>

Now we are going to use these lines and shapes to make a design.

		
<p>Step 1 Start by 'taking a line for a walk' all across your page. Start at one edge and finish at another. This makes a pattern. Only do one line. An adult might help you with this part.</p>	<p>Step 2 Choose a different colour and a different line or shape for each section – I started with zig zags then stars.</p>	<p>Step 3 Keep going until all the shapes are filled and you have a colourful design. Make another if you enjoyed it!</p>

Extra - GAME

– You can play by yourself or swap with a partner or in a group to play together.

You need a piece of paper and some pencils or pens each.

- Take a few second to make a scribble or squiggle on the page
- Swap with a partner if you have one, turn the page all the way around and look at it – does it remind you of anything?
- Make it into a picture – like Paul Klee has above. Spend 5 minutes on this part to add detail. Now swap back with your partner if you have one!
- Sometimes it's even fun to turn the page over and see if anything shows through that you could turn into a new image.
